Workshops

1. Domestic violence ‘Never going to beat you’: Cris McCurly (Ben Hoare Bell Solicitors), Tina McInerney (TM Women’s Worker), Ronke Johnson (Women’s Aid Federation)

Domestic violence continues to be an issue of concern for all communities irrespective of class, creed or background. With reference to Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities, a particular and very current concern, are child protection issues in relation to safeguarding procedures and potential care orders. This workshop will explore the complex issue of safeguarding children while seeking support when in a domestic violence situation. We will hear from both the legal experts in the field and the GRT communities.

2. Hate Crime ‘Beginning a dialogue of LGBT inclusion within the GRT community’: Chris Smith (Travellers’ Times), Henry Chapman, Cassie McDonagh (TM Partnerships Officer), GALOP

Due to identified needs from GRT LGBT communities, part of The Traveller Movement’s #OperationReportHate campaign includes an awareness raising project aimed at opening up a much needed conversation within the GRT community about sexual identity. The project is working with a number of GRT people to identify needs, explore safeguarding issues, develop resources, support and begin a dialogue. This workshop will screen an educational film, produced by the community members in partnership with TM, and explore the issues that LGBT community members encounter within their own communities.

3. Policing ‘Improving relations between the police and Gypsy, Roma, Traveller communities’: Matthew Brindley (TM Researcher), Frank Sheppard (Community member and Landscape Gardener), Petr Torak MBE (Roma Consultant and Police Officer)

New research by The Traveller Movement is looking at the everyday barriers that prevent the police and people from the Gypsy, Roma, Traveller communities having confident, cohesive and trusting relationships. The research project, which started earlier this year, has interviewed nearly thirty officers and community members across England. It hopes to better understand police officers’ and community members’ perceptions and experiences of each other, identify good and bad practice, and develop practical solutions that promote cohesion and build confidence. The initial findings from the research will be presented to the workshop, accompanied by the first hand experiences and expertise of both community members and police officers.

4. Economic inclusion ‘Mapping the progressive roots to economic inclusion for young people from the Gypsy, Roma and Traveller Communities’: Lisa Smith (Travellers’ Times), Ivy and Betsy (Interns at Friends, Families and Travellers), Patricia Stapleton (TM Partnerships Manager), Christina Kerrigan (TM Intern), Sabrina Stewart (former TM Intern).

Access to education and sustainable employment opportunities continue to be an issue of concern for Gypsy, Traveller and Roma (GRT) communities. Poor educational attainment can impact on young GRT people’s ability to enter the world of work, preventing them from achieving full economic empowerment. This in turn leads to economic marginalisation and social exclusion. The purpose of the workshop is to promote progressive roots to economic inclusion of GRT young people and share good practice. The workshop will explore the economic empowerment of young GRT people through employment programmes and through the promotion of educational attainment. There will be a discussion of how young GRT people can be empowered to achieve positive economic outcomes. Members and graduates of The Traveller Movement internship programme, now in its 7th year, will share their experiences of working for The Traveller Movement. In addition, young people from various groups across the UK, Travellers’ Times, FFT and others, will share their experiences of work and educational programmes.
